Welcome to our Sixth Form at Queen Elizabeth's Girls' School. I hope that you will enjoy reading our prospectus. It will give you a flavour of what we offer, but we hope that you will come and meet our students and staff so that you can get a real sense of what the QE Sixth Form offers.

The school and the Sixth Form were inspected by Ofsted in November 2007 and I was delighted that both were judged to be 'outstanding'. Our results and value added measures have stayed high since, so I am confident that we are just as good!

Our priorities are:

- Enabling every student to fulfil her potential.
- Development of self-confidence and the personal and teamwork skills which will enable each individual to succeed in all aspects of 21st century life.

Sixth Form Life

Queen Elizabeth's Girls' School is a friendly, lively environment with a strong ethos of hard work. Students are very successful and regularly achieve A level grades which are far higher than would be expected from their GCSE results.

We offer students a high quality education together with the support to enable girls to develop as independent, confident and responsible adults. We have a proven track record of success in post-16 education providing a wide range of courses to meet students' needs. We provide individual support and guidance to ensure each and every one of our students takes full advantage of the rich educational and social opportunities on offer.

All students studying in our Sixth Form have an individual Tutor offering support and extensive and careers and education guidance, this ensures their smooth transition both into and beyond the Sixth Form and enables academic targets to be met. The Sixth Form Tutors are experienced and are fully trained on the UCAS system. They provide invaluable support for students applying to university and guide students through the UCAS application process. Students are also given the opportunity to make a contribution to the school community in and out of the school. Typically students will support younger pupils in their lessons in school or will use this time to experience working in a field that interests them. Those students who want to study medicine, teaching, dentistry, veterinary sciences and performing arts find this invaluable.

Facilities

All Sixth Form students have access to a Sixth Form Study Centre which is attached to the excellent Learning Resource Centre we have at our school. We also have a large common room area for socialising with an additional kitchen and pool table.

Six in the City

The Sixth Form Newsletter, run by and run for the Sixth Form, published every month. Anyone can contribute to the articles.

The Global Student Forum

The Global Student Forum provides an invaluable opportunity to tackle spiritual, moral and cultural issues underlying global citizenship. Students involved make a real impact across the school in raising awareness and action. Previous themes for the Global Student Forum have included trade justice, child soldiers, access to water to name a few.

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Education Engineering Scheme

In this scheme students work together as a team to try and solve a real problem which has been set by an engineering company, previously QEGS has been linked with Lovell Partnerships Ltd. The team work with one or two engineers to suggest and develop solutions, with a lot of the work being carried out at a residential workshop held at a university (Cambridge University's Engineering Department for the past few years). The scheme is recognised as a challenging and a very rewarding project and is run nationwide by the Royal Academy of Engineering.

Lessons from Auschwitz Project

Through the Lessons from Auschwitz Project, Sixth Form students take part in two afternoon seminars and a one-day visit to the former Nazi extermination camp of Auschwitz-Birkenau in order to then pass on the lessons learnt to the whole school and wider community.

Work Shadowing

Every year, Year 12 students have the opportunity to organise their own Work Shadowing placement to give them a deeper insight into the world of work and an idea of the direction they might wish to take in terms of their own careers. This involves shadowing a person in a chosen career field for a week. In the past students have shadowed doctors, vets, barristers, television personalities and journalists.

We also work with the Social Mobility Foundation, a registered charity with the objective of making a real improvement in social mobility for bright young people from lower-income backgrounds. Students are offered the support of e-mentoring, summer internships and university application sessions.

Offers of work experience opportunities are always gratefully received.

Women of the Future Ambassadors Programme

Every year a group of Year 13 students are invited to attend the Women of the Future reception. This gives students the opportunity to meet 100 award winning inspiring women from diverse industries as well as the Ambassadors from the programme. Miss Pearson, Head of Sixth Form at Queen Elizabeth's Girls' School was recently awarded the Inspirational Educator Award for her outstanding work in education, raising the aspiration levels of school girls.





Tamara Deputy Head Girl

This is my seventh year at **Oueen Elizabeth's Girls'** School and I am one of two Deputy Head Girls. I help organise Year 7 Team Building Day as well as other responsibilities, which have included setting up a Longboard Society. QE gives you opportunities to collaborate with other people in the school community and explore leadership roles. Participating in a variety of different events and clubs allows you to contribute to the school, creating a harmonious and successful community.







Tavneet Katie Charity Officers

Being Charity Representatives, our role is to raise money for a variety of charities. By doing this we are able to gain a deeper understanding of what these charities do and how the money we raise can help those in need.

During this year we aim to fundraise for a wide variety of charities, including local charities, to help better the community. By the end of the year we hope to have encouraged other students to be enthusiastic about charity and to continue to fundraise, resulting in a longlasting legacy of charity here at QE.

Last year the Sixth Form raised enough money to sponsor a room at Centrepoint.







The vast majority of students who study A levels at QE Girls' then apply to university.

There is a full programme of support in place at QE to give the girls accurate and up to date information regarding making university applications including an annual UCAS Day.

UCAS stands for the University and Colleges Admissions Service and all university applications in this country are processed via this system.

At QE we run an annual 'UCAS Day' where experienced staff give information to the entire Year 12 cohort on how to make successful university applications. This includes:

- How to access and use the website
 - Writing winning personal statements
- Making informed choices

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We also provide an evening session for parents so that they too are fully informed of the process and can support their daughters accordingly. Also as part of this day students can attend small group lectures on applying for specific subject areas such as Medicine, Law and for making Oxbridge applications.

The school has an established link with the University of York who also send a representative to advise on undergraduate life and student finance.

Students are fully mentored during the university application cycle by individual Tutors and experienced, specifically trained staff.

The level of success our students achieve in acquiring places on their chosen courses and in their preferred institutions (84% of girls in the 2013 cohort were placed in their chosen course and institution) makes us confident in considering this a real strength in the Sixth Form.



FAQs

- Q: How many students do we take into the Sixth Form?
- A: Normally around 160 pupils in Year 12, with about 30 coming from other schools.
- Q: Is there a dress code?
- A: Yes— Sixth Formers do not need to wear uniform but do need to dress appropriately for school.
- Q: Are subjects taught by a single member of staff?
- A: Some are but most groups are shared between two staff to allow for more detailed specialist work.
- Q: How many students in a group/subject?
- A: Our A level groups are normally between 15-20 and we try to stick to a maximum of 20 in a class. Some subjects (Media, ICT) have a limit of 18 in a group.
- Q: Do we have free periods?
- A: Yes you do. Each AS subject has 9 hours per fortnight. We run a 2 week timetable with 50 periods over the fortnight.
- Q: How much work are we expected to do?
- A: It is difficult to say how much work you are expected to do for each subject as there are subtle variations. As a 'rule of thumb' guide you should expect to work for 40 hours a week if you are studying at Advanced Level. This includes the time you are working in school.
- Q: Can you change courses?
- A: Every year there are a small number of students who start courses and quickly recognise that actually they don't like the subjects, perhaps it's not quite what they imagined. Yes of course you may change but, remember, the longer you leave it the more difficult it becomes. We allow students to change courses until the end of September.
- Q: Do all schools and colleges offer subjects in blocks?
- A: As far as we are aware yes they do.





Tabitha Lizzie Common Room Officers

As Common Room Officers we ensure the common room has a calm environment for both relaxation and study. We work with Miss Malone, Deputy Head of Sixth Form, to keep sixth form students notified of the latest events and ensure that up-to-date information regarding the UCAS application process is available. We are currently raising money to improve the common room's facilities.

We offer a package of GCSEs which will allow students the opportunity to gain further level 2 qualifications and prepare themselves for advanced courses in the future.

Priority for this course is given to students currently studying at Queen Elizabeth's Girls' School.

New Entrants

- Select those courses you wish to follow.
- Complete an application form.
- Complete the relevant sections on the reference form and hand it to someone who knows you well to complete. This will usually be your Head of Year, Tutor or Headteacher.
- Send your application to the address on the form. Do not wait for your reference to be completed.

Interviews will take place following receipt of a reference with relevant predicted grades.

After you have received a conditional offer of a place for September 2014, there is an Induction Day which is held just after the final GCSE exams in June. The planned date for 2014 is Wednesday 25th June.

If you apply for certain subjects there will also be bridging lessons which we would like you to attend. Subjects are Maths, French, Spanish, PE, Sociology, Psychology, Government & Politics and Technology.

Details of the timetable for these sessions will be included with your offer letter for a conditional place.

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Entry requirements

AS/A2 - The school entry requirement is a 5.5 point GCSE score (to include English Language) calculated as follows:

A*=8, A=7, B=6, C=5, D=4, E=3, F=2, G=1

Add the points from your GCSEs and divide by number taken.

Also – very specific requirements may apply to A level subjects and students will need to meet these requirements in addition to the 'minimum' qualifications. See subject information booklet for specific entry requirements.

2013 Examination Results

Once again the school has achieved outstanding results at A level.

This year group achieved very well and made considerable progress between AS and A2 results. Key benchmarks are:

A*/A	A*-B	A*-E
26.64%	52.96%	99.16%

These results are comparable with our best ever in 2011. Despite the national decline in the proportion of A^*/A grades, QEGS has achieved its highest ever proportion of such grades.

The average SCAAT(School and College Achievement and Attainment Tables) points per student was 735.1 and the average points per A2 entry was 228.3 (the highest average point score achieved at QEGS). The ALPs value added measures are very strong for the year group as a whole and for individual subjects.Value added is 'excellent' once again – a record which has been sustained for more than 10 years.
