Visit from a Politician

Freud Museum Trip

Psychology and RS students curiously wandered around the world renowned psychologist and creator of modern-world-therapy Sigmund Freud's house in Hampstead on Tuesday 9th January. Students were given profound and detailed insight into Freud's later years in life before he passed by a keen Freudian who evoked discussion between students during his teaching sessions. The students participated in two sessions. In the first half, the appointed spokesperson for the museum enlightened students on how Freud's house became a museum and Freud's polarising psychodynamic approach. His humour was deeply appreciated by the students and it even allowed students to view this trip as not a lecture but a day of learning through interaction.



Before the second half of the trip proceeded, students were encouraged to explore Freud's house as if it was their own, they were even invited to use his toilet! Students mostly enjoyed Freud's office, which was his sanctuary, because it displayed his love for collecting archaic objects. Freud's office housed the famous couch which his clients laid on during their therapy session and although students couldn't lay on it, they could experience the client 'feel' on the replica couch upstairs. In the museum shop that was arranged with pins inscribed with the iconic aspects of the 'Tripartite personality', students were able to purchase items such as pens, books and even cards that aspired to unwind the tangles in one's inner psyche. During the second session, students gained a deeper understanding of Freud's 'Little Hans case study'. The speaker's ability to weave his own personal anecdotes and Freud's details of the case, changed the general consensus



of the 'Little Hans case' being seen as 'weird' to an 'eye-opening perspective into how children navigate their emotions', as quoted by a Year 13 psychology student.

The speaker ended the session with a proverb (not verbatim) that left many pondering for the day to follow, 'instead of administering medication or making someone undergo systematic desensitisation, a conversation should be had. Those methods are completely valid to use and they are effective, but sometimes what a person needs is to be heard. So instead of telling someone what to do, just listen, it goes a long way. The devil is in the details.'

This trip was thoroughly enjoyed by Psychology and RS students and many wished to visit Freud's house again.



Bertha Earth - Storytelling day at The Central Film school



The Maths Challenge is an annual event that Queen Elizabeth's Girls' School is very proud to participate in as it is an enrichment opportunity for our students. The Maths Challenge is a 60-minute, multiple-choice competition designed to make students think. It encourages mathematical reasoning, precision of thoughts and fluency in using mathematical techniques to solve stimulating problems.

The UKMT has over 500,00 entries annually which makes it the most popular mathematical event across the country.

Students who achieve the Gold level have the opportunity to compete in the Kangaroo and the Olympiad follow-on rounds.


Kooth Assemblies


Some top performing A level chemistry students from QEGS sat the UK Chemistry Olympiad - an international competition of extremely challenging questions.

A new initiative is being launched to acknowledge students' achievements as our school expectations around the school values become well embedded in a student's day-to-day experiences.


