Applying for Apprenticeships

- Separate application form for each apprenticeship
- Share knowledge, skills and experience in a similar way to a university personal statement
- Tasks could include aptitude tests, record themselves answering set questions and attend an interview (virtual/real life)
- Apprenticeship Programmes are released throughout the year

Pathway 2. University - UCAS (Universities and Colleges Admissions Service)

All students who wish to study at UK universities must apply through UCAS. The exception is if you are applying to an Art Foundation course

The applications are submitted in the Autumn Term:

- 1st UCAS Deadline – 15th October 2024 - for Medicine/Dentistry/Veterinary degrees and Oxbridge applications

The provisional school deadline is October Half Term for all other courses

- 2nd UCAS Deadline – 29th January 2025

Planning and Application Process Year 12 Summer Term

March 2024 - September 2024

- Students register with UCAS and begin to research and narrow down subject areas and universities/apprenticeships
- Year 12 visit the UCAS exhibition day - Tuesday 19th March
- Students send draft versions of personal statements to tutors via unifrog - as soon as possible. Examples of personal statements for all courses can be found on Unifrog
- Students utilise Unifrog - 'Geek Out' sections on the Subject Library and super curricular resources to delve deeper into subject areas
- Students are strongly encouraged to complete MOOCs in their areas of interest



Planning and Application Process **Year 13 Autumn Term**

September 2024

- Students finalise their Personal Statement
- References are checked and completed by Form Tutors and the Sixth Form Team
- Students finalise their choices on UCAS – 5 choices (4 for Medicine and 1 other choice)

October 2024

- Oxbridge/Medicine/Dentistry/Veterinary – 15th October 2024
- All other courses - Proposed School Deadline October Half Term



UCAS Application Process - October 2024 – May 2025

Students wait for offers after applying and may be asked to attend interviews, dependent on the course

Final choices - once all five offers have been received students then confirm two choices:

Firm Choice – First choice

Insurance Choice – Second choice (the entry requirements will be lower for this choice compared to your firm choice)

Types of Offer:

Unconditional – Means the university will take the student regardless of grades achieved

Conditional – Student needs to meet a certain entry requirement

Contextual Offers - these recognise that academic potential is not always indicated in grades and considers how personal circumstances may have impacted achievement. Contextual offers often offer a grade reduction below the standard entry requirements for the course.

Other Qualifications – Some universities will offer a lower entry requirement if the students gains other qualifications e.g. Extended Project Qualification



Unifrog



Unifrog allows students to search, and save all of the activities and qualifications that they have completed in support of their application

University courses, advice and exemplar personal statements can be looked at on the platform

There is also a wealth of information on Apprenticeships, Study Overseas, Gap Year Opportunities, MOOCS that students can complete in relation to areas of interest

When searching courses it breaks down the choices into - Aspirational, Safe and Solid according to students inputting their target/predicted grades

Personal statements are written on unifrog and shared with staff

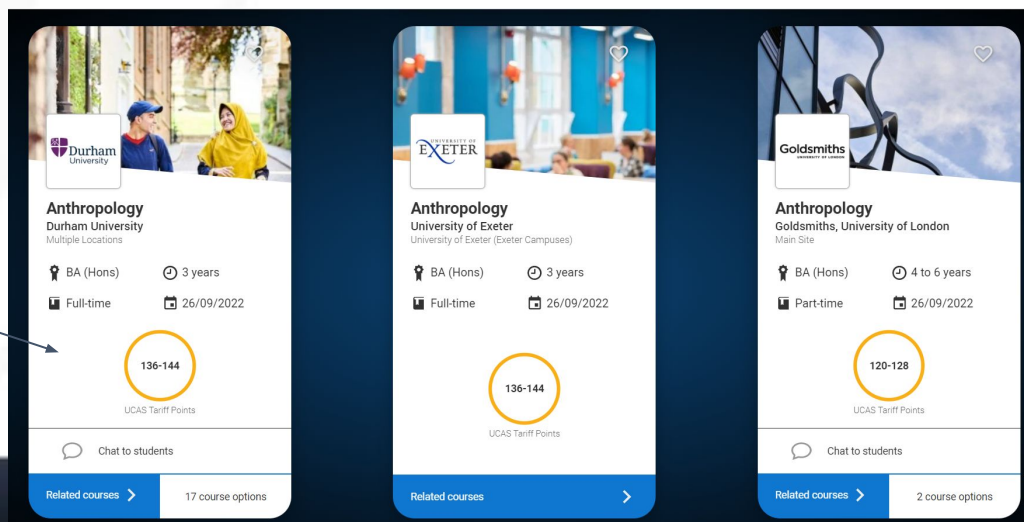

Entry Requirements - UCAS

Adult Nursing at University of Birmingham

▼ A level - BBB

Typical offer: BBB - You must also meet in full the GCSE entry requirements for the programme. General Studies: Not accepted, but a good performance may be taken into account if you fail to meet the conditions of your offer. All applicants must meet in full both the GCSE and Level 3/higher qualification entry requirements for the Bachelor of Nursing programme. The only exception to meeting the GCSE requirements in full applies to some Access applicants, please see the relevant section below for more details.

GCSE requirements:

5 GCSEs at grade C/4 or above which must include English, Mathematics and a Science subject. We do not accept level 2 equivalents e.g. BTEC, Key skills

Preferred subjects and grades:

Biology, Psychology or Sociology A level, and two others. Welsh Baccalaureate at grade B can substitute one of the A Levels.

Edexcel Level 3 extended project:

Grade A in the Extended Project Qualification (EPQ) is accepted in addition to 3 A Levels (of equivalent level 3 qualifications). You would be made a variable offer e.g. BBB or BBC plus A in the EPQ

The Oxbridge/ Medicine Programme

Following the summer exams, Year 12 students will be invited to be a part of the programme. There will be regular meetings and a google classroom will be set up with resources, events and advice on applying for the University of Oxford or Cambridge or for Medicine:

The Programme offers the following:

- Consideration of entry requirements/college systems
- Students applying/attending Masterclasses
- Members of staff who have studied at Oxbridge to speak to students
- Interview practice and development of spoken language skills
- Provided with practice assessment test practice and guidance - UCAT, BMAT, LNAT etc
- Drafting Personal Statements using exemplar personal statements of successful candidates



The UCAS Application Form

1. Personal Details

Name, Address, Contact Details, Nationality, Criminal Convictions, Disabilities

2. Additional Information

Ethnic Origin

Courses related to the degree that you have completed

Parental Education

Sections 1, 2, 4 and 5 will be completed before the summer holiday.

3. Choices

You have a choice of five places/courses that you can apply for. If you are applying for Medicine you have 4 choices and one non medical choice. If you are applying to Oxbridge you cannot apply to both Oxford and Cambridge.

4. Education

Educational Institutions Attended

Examinations taken, GCSEs and pending A Levels

Other Qualifications e.g. EPQ, University short courses,

5. Employment

Part time work

Voluntary Work

6. Personal Statement



Choices

Your choices must be realistic based on your GCSE and A Level target/predicted grades

You should have a variety of entry requirements within your choices e.g.

1. ABB – University of Liverpool – English Literature
2. ABB – Royal Holloway University – English and Drama
3. AAB – University of Sheffield – English Literature
4. AAA – University College London – English
5. ABB/BBB – Cardiff University – English Literature

Once you have received a response from all of the institutions that you have applied to, you will need to select two; your firm choice and your *insurance* choice.

1 = Firm Choice

2 = Insurance

It is very important that these two choices do not have the same entry requirements otherwise there is no point in the insurance offer.



Course Choices

- You should consider if you are going to study a single honours, joint honours or a combined course
- **GCSE entry requirements** – some universities will have GCSE as well as A Level requirements. Be sure to check for example, if they require a 6 in Mathematics and you have a 5 which could hamper your application. You are likely to have your application rejected if you don't meet the GCSE entry requirements
- Make sure you have read in detail the content of the course using the university website/prospectus. This is especially important if it is a course that you have not studied at A Level



Personal Statement

- 75% of your statement should be focused on why you would like to study the subject
- You should use all of the space provided (47 lines)
- Correct punctuation
- Avoid repeating information contained in the other sections of the application form
- Clear logical structure
- Good command of English
- Error free
- Avoid jargon, abbreviation or non-standard English
- You are applying to study an academic course therefore you will need to include academic references to books, research etc

Start putting bullet points together on a piece of paper to think about what you have been doing that relates to your area of interest



School References and Predicted Grades

- School references are an important part of the application
- The school reference will be divided into three areas:
 - School context
 - Extenuating circumstances (if applicable)
 - Information specific to the applicant and relevant to the course(s) applied for
- Predicted Grades are worked out using the Y12 April Mock grade. Students are usually predicted one grade higher than the grade they achieve in the April Mocks



Pathway 3: Taking a Gap Year

- Be clear about why you are taking a year out and what you are going to have to show for the year
- Employers will ask about what you did – going on holiday for a few months does not sound great
- Employment
- Work Experience Placements/Voluntary Work/Internships
- Unifrog has information on taking a Gap Year



What students should be doing now

1. Make sure you are working effectively on your A Levels in order to have as many options open to you as possible.
2. Research the courses that you are interested in and shortlist these on unifrog - apprenticeships and degrees
3. Check based on a realistic set of grades, which courses would be open to you - unifrog
4. Sign up to open days for the institutions that you are interested in
5. Start to draft your personal statement on unifrog - there are examples for each subject areas on the subject guide. Share with your tutor for feedback
6. Complete super curricular work (books, journals, lectures, podcasts, films) on your subject area - what you learn can be added to your personal statement. This might also include completing the EPQ



Parents – What can you do to help?

- Go to Open Days - attend virtually/real life and do this together if possible
- Read through and support them with their personal statement
- Visiting places related to their course e.g. A trip to the British Museum if they looking at studying Anthropology
- Encourage reading around and in depth the subject area they are interested in - 'geek out' on unifrog provides this
- Discuss current affairs and encourage them to read/watch/engage with the news (Guardian, Independent, Times, BBC)
- Make sure they are revising effectively - help to test them/revise with them. (30 minutes slots with 5 minute break)
