From the Headteacher

This edition of the newsletter includes some of the opportunities organised for our students to develop academic skills and aspiration and to nurture critical thinking. I hope you will have heard about Lyfta from your children. This addition to our pastoral curriculum for years 7 - 13, supports the school to nurture curiosity in the world around us and its inhabitants. Lyfta does this through the medium of a 360 view and film which tells the stories of people, individuals or families, living in different contexts and of people living in completely different circumstances facing challenges related to their contexts. Through nurturing critical thinking, curiosity and importantly, compassion, we can work toward supporting our students to discern misinformation, disinformation and reality. These are important and powerful skills in a world which is increasingly embracing AI alongside the growing dependency of young people on social media and digital news feeds which perpetuate specific echo chambers.

Schools in Barnet have collaborated with the local authority to support a campaign which aspires to make Barnet primary and secondary schools smartphone free. Year 8 Talk by Nicola Bonn

On 23 January, Year 8 were invited to a talk in the hall from Nicola Bonn, host and creator of podcast 'Outspoken Beauty'. Nicola is also a radio and TV presenter at Global Media & Entertainment Limited. Nicola spoke about social media and the importance of understanding that 'not all is what it seems'. She reminded students to look at social media through an objective and critical lens and used examples where certain social media influencers enhance their looks by using filters to look 'perfect' or promote branded footwear to purposely boost sales. She also spoke about 'what makes you amazing' and the importance of recognising and nurturing the values in ourselves. Students were very engaged in the talk and were encouraged in their personal time, to put aside their phones and gadgets to engage in other social activities such as going for a walk and talking to friends and family.



Visit to the Old Bailey

This wasn't the case for Charles I who was put to trial without a head! We had the chance to listen in on two debates. One from the House of Lords, explaining their thoughts on healthcare during the winter, another from the House of Commons, talking about the armed forces. Before travelling home, we participated in a workshop about petitions and how they are created. We even made our own!

Our favourite part was, listening to the MPs and how they construct their talks to be engaging, persuasive and still make their point. If you are interested in Politics, Law or Parliaments History we definitely recommend visiting Parliament.

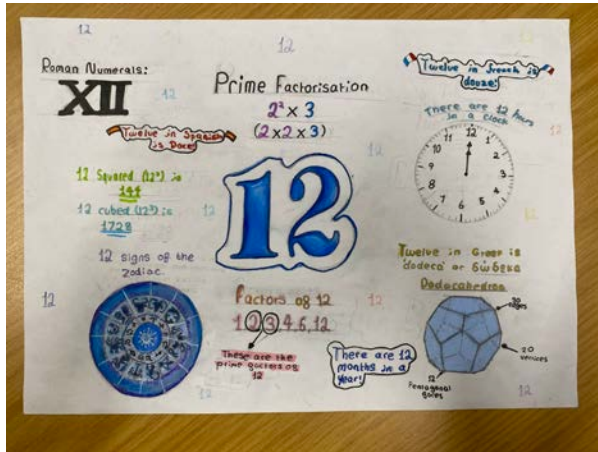
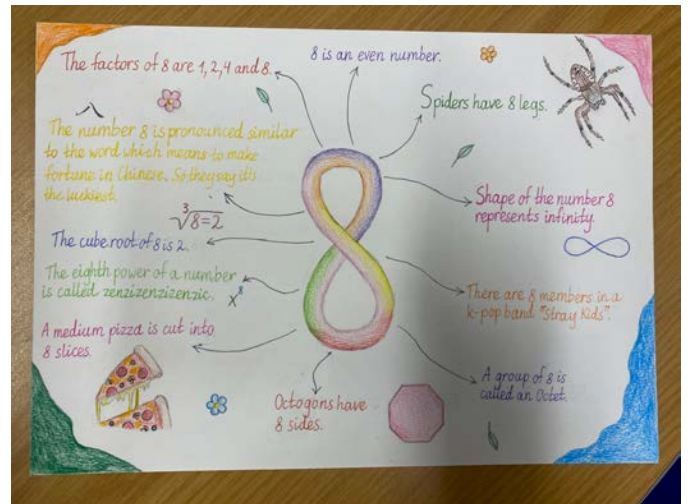

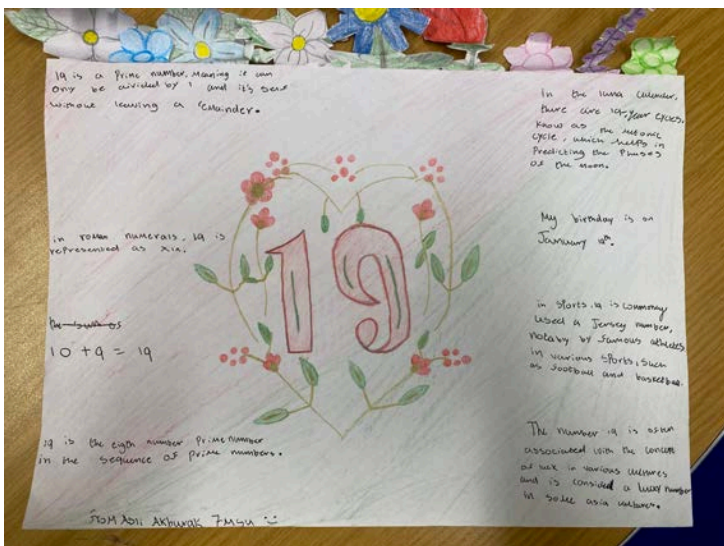

Be Bold Change Makers Programme

The Be Bold Change Makers Programme is a programme which is specifically designed to empower young people, specifically women to make a change in the world and close the gender gap. Our school is working with the International Coalition of Girls Schools and participates in online workshops where young changemakers can collaborate and brainstorm ideas. They also include training sessions which prepare us for our main goal. Our group consists of a mix of year 10's and year 9's and we have already participated in 4 workshops - my favourite activity has most definitely been the breakout rooms. This is essentially when everyone in the meeting is given a topic to discuss and are separated into "breakout rooms" within the call, one of the previous topics was "How can we aim to create equality in sports?". What my team and I discussed was giving women higher pay because despite performing the same work, women are paid substantially less than men.

Everything we are doing now such as the workshops and training are preparing us for our long-term goal and are also preparing us for our "Changemaker challenge". Through participating in the workshops, we will improve our public speaking skills, organisational skills and presentation. Within our group, we will have to pair with another student and will be paired with another pair from another school. We work with schools from all around the world so we could be paired with a pair from Australia all the way to Hawaii. In our new groups, we will come up with a unique idea to close the gender gap and aim to bring our ideas to life. We will then have to pitch our ideas with confidence in front of the changemaker panel - 1st, 2nd and 3rd place will be rewarded with a certificate, badge and e-card which can either be donated to a women's rights organisation or can be used at a feminist charity shop. The first workshop focused on writing CVs, searching for relevant work experience and/or part time job roles, and how to effectively make use of networks. The second session built on this with a workshop on filling out application forms and writing cover letters.

Sophia in Year 12 attended both sessions and says:

Last month, we had an opportunity to attend a careers talk based around CVs and application forms. The event, led by Jo, was incredibly insightful and provided us all with valuable tips on how to stand out to potential employers. We learned how to apply CVs to each job role, highlighting relevant skills and experiences while keeping the format simple and easy to read. The talk also taught us how to effectively answer application form questions and how to use specific examples to demonstrate our skills and achievement. Overall, the careers talk was extremely effective, as it provided us with the tools and knowledge to improve applications and to increase chances in the future.

Jo is planning on coming in again for a third session on interview practice to give students the opportunity to have mock interviews for a fictional job they have prepared for. Thank you to Jo and we are looking forward to welcoming you into school again soon.

On Thursday 6th February students from year 9-13 were fortunate to be given the opportunity to attend a careers talk delivered by Stefania Ruggeri, an Entrepreneur and Brand design coach. The talk was extremely insightful and informative through sharing her career journey, able to answer a variety of questions regarding marketing, the creative industry and becoming a successful entrepreneur. It was beneficial emphasising the different pathways across the marketing and creative industry, her journey reflecting the many possibilities of being able to make career changes at any stage.

Careers Assemblies

This term, students have had careers assemblies linked to the current labour market. Year 7 and 8 received information about the labour market in Barnet, including which careers have seen the most growth and the skills most in demand from employers. Construction, Healthcare and Creative careers have seen the most growth recently, so students will have had the opportunity to hear speakers from these sectors over the course of the year. Students then looked at the top qualifications taken in Barnet, and the companies that employ the most people. All of this can be helpful to students when they are considering their future options and deciding on subjects to help them get into their chosen careers.

In light of the labour market information, Year 9 and 10 had an assembly from a provider of technical qualifications in the creative industry, Big Creative Education (BCE). They received information about the qualifications on offer, the entry requirements and some case studies of past students who have gone on to have successful careers in creative industries.

Year 10 and 12 had an assembly from a speaker representing the ASK Apprenticeships programme to give them an overview of the kinds of apprenticeships available in different sectors, where to find apprenticeships and alternative technical qualifications including T-Levels. Year 11 and 13 will be hearing from technical education providers after half term.

Careers Schemes

Year 11 Careers Meetings

Every Year 11 student had the opportunity to meet with an independent career adviser to discuss their Post-16 options.

Education Development Trust Work Experience Scheme

This year, we have partnered with the Education Development Trust (EDT) to seek work experience placements for a small group of sixth form students. Students met with an EDT representative, who spoke with them about their interests and matched them with a suitable employer during the school holidays. One of our Year 13 students had a very successful week at Code Kids Robotics, helping children with coding and technology.

Career Accelerator Programme

The Career Accelerator Programme matches students with a mentor in an industry they would like to work in. Following a launch assembly on 27th January, eight Year 12 students applied and all were successful in securing a place on the programme. Students will now have the opportunity to meet with their mentors at various points throughout the year to gain tailored careers support.

Skills Builder Programme

This term, we launched the Skills Builder Programme across the entire school. Skills Builder Partnership is an organisation who believe there are core transferable skills which underpin success at every stage of life, and are essential tools that children should learn and develop.

They have developed the Skills Builder Programme to allow teachers to explicitly teach these skills once per week during form time. The programme is based on the premise that there are three levels of skill that we develop throughout our lives:

Basic skills are the ones we need in order to function in the world, e.g. motor skills, reading, writing, speaking, listening. We usually learn these in primary school.

Technical skills are the subject specific skills and knowledge that we need to do well in exams and to do specific jobs e.g. a doctor learning how to perform surgery.

Essential skills are the important skills we need for success in every aspect of life, such as teamwork and problem solving, but we are not usually taught these in the same way as basic and technical skills.

Learning the essential skills alongside academic subjects means that when students leave school, they will have both the skills and the qualifications needed to succeed in the world of work. Research shows that having essential skills halves the likelihood of being out of work, and increases earnings across a lifetime. We are pleased that every student at Queen Elizabeth's Girls' School will benefit from spending dedicated time each week developing these skills, increasing their career prospects and life chances.
